

The Students' Council is the very first step in running a school democratically. The most crucial element, however, is not the Council, but the Students. Without students, there isn't anyone to make improvements, or decisions of any sort. With enough support, almost anything is possible. Therefore, if any sort of educational change is to be made, (and believe me, there are some things that are begging to be fixed up) it is the responsibility of the entire student body to get cracking.

Do everything in your power to set up an official representative body, a students' council. But remember; there are two important points to consider. To represent the most interest, EVERYONE must be involved. And to have a truly meaningful voice in the affairs of school, dedication and action are the keys.






CHESS CLUB





Unfortunately, due to lack of funds, it was necessary to discontinue "Miss United Theatres"...Well, that's show biz.






