WAGAR HIGH SCHOOL RENAMED

Côte St. Luc's Wagar High School will be renamed after Giovanni Palatucci, who is credited with saving 5,000 Italian Jews during the Holocaust, the English Montreal School Board announced.

Wagar was closed last year after 40 years as a Côte St. Luc landmark, and its facility currently houses John Grant High School, which serves special needs students, and the Marymount Adult Centre.

The EMSB says this is the first public school in Canada named after a Holocaust hero.

"By recognizing the heroism of Giovanni Palatucci, we will also be honouring the bravery of countless men and women, the memory of the millions of victims who perished in the Holocaust, the victims of hatred in places like Nanking, Bosnia, Rwanda, Cambodia, the western Sudan and the tragedy of the Armenians," says EMSB commissioner Syd Wise, also a former Wagar principal.


Last year, the Jewish and Italian communities honoured Giorgio Perlasca, who saved Jews in Budapest, Hungary.

Giovanni Palatucci was based in Fiume, which was in northern Italy and now part of Croatia, where he was in charge of a department relating to foreigners. Palatucci's first act of resistance was to falsify the documents and visas of Jews destined for reclusion camps, as decreed by Italy's 1938 anti-Semitic laws.


Palatucci became Fiume's chief of police in 1943, after Mussolini's fall and the German occupation of Italy. In that capacity, he destroyed files of Jews destined for deportation to concentration camps, and provided Jewish community members with money and false documents to enable them to escape. Palatucci, in danger at that point, was offered safe haven in Switzerland, but sent his Jewish fiancée instead.

Palatucci was arrested by the Gestapo in September 1944, and was condemned to death. His sentence was commuted, and he was transferred to the Dachau concentration camp, where he died Feb. 10, 1945 at the age of 36 — differing accounts say he died of malnutrition or was shot. Palatucci was honoured at Yad Vashem, Israel's Holocaust memorial, last year.

Wise said a ceremony will take place sometime this spring to rename the school.

Teacher's Strike

The beginning of the new school term was delayed due to an eleven day strike by the 71,000 teachers of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers (PAPT), and the Centrale de l'Enseignement du Québec (CEQ), leaving one million students with an unexpected two week layoff.

While teachers picketed the PSBGM building on 6000 Fielding, students with time off and no assignments (Beginning of new term) were able to go

to movies, hit the slopes and play plenty of Hockey. Asked by this reporter how they felt about this break, most replied that two weeks were enough but another

week might have been "excessive". Of course there was also some anxiety prevailing among the grade eleven students who had to apply for CEGEP admission next year. Fortunately, the strike was over soon enough and we were able to fill out forms with plenty of time.

There were also other

consequences, such as the Winter Carnival being re-scheduled for a week later, the lack of spectators at the Snow Bowl, and the lack of publicity for the first Reach For The Top game. Fortunately there was a large turnout for that overpowering win. As of now school has resumed and after asking many tea-

chers, they felt the two weeks lost wouldn't have a serious outcome on their schedules and would be able to get through the whole course without much cramming.

As for the teachers, was it worth it? Apparently not. Salary gains are barely sufficient enough to cover the rise of the cost of living, especially for those teachers with more seniority. In the area of workloads, their big plea for fixed class sizes was not accepted by the government and conditions remain the same. They did make some gains, such as: Supervision of recess being counted in the

workload, and the right to volunteer for extracurricular activities, instead of being compelled to participate. In all, the teachers only got a Status Quo that could have been reached without striking and we almost at the point of losing everything when government negotiator Lucien Bouchard threatened to recommend back to work legislation with less than the offer given to them. Now its going to take the teachers six months under the new contract to make up for the money lost in this strike. It certainly doesn't appear to have been worth it.

Boycott in Moscow? Yes!!!

The Olympics, one of the world's oldest and most prestigious traditions are in danger this summer of having many of its most important member nations boycott it. Many nations, led by the United States, infuriated by the Soviet invasion into Afghanistan, have called for a boycott of the Summer Olympic games to be held in Moscow. Are they following the right train of thought?

The Olympics are an open forum where athletes from all over the world attend to compete against each other in search of the coveted gold medal. These athletes train for years, starting from ages of five or six in some cases, working long, grinding hours trying to perfect a skill. They have to make huge sacrifices such as not having a varied social life because of the training, they must watch what they eat, they can't stay up late, etc... Yet, their consolation is that some day they'll be good enough to represent their country in the Olympics and try to win that medal. They are athletes; people in search for the highest peak in their sport. Therefore, after all these hard sacrifices can one imagine the terrible feeling they must have upon knowing they won't be going to compete?

The counter-argument provided by Lord Killanin, president of the International Olympics and Sports don't mix. Well, Politics and

Sports shouldn't mix but they do and one must accept that. In 1936, Adolf Hitler refused to shake hands with the great Jesse Owens; In 1968 two Black medal winners raise the Black Hand in solidarity with their movement. In 1972 Jewish Athletes were massacred by Palestinians and in 1976 African nations boycotted the Montreal games because of South Africa. Mr. Killanin, one must be objective and realize that they do mix and there's nothing that can be done.

The events that have occurred are very critical. The U.S.S.R. sent troops into Afghanistan, killing the existing leader of that country, then establishing a "puppet-government" and started a war between its soldiers and the Muslims inhabiting the country. This is a criminal act of expansionism on the part of the U.S.S.R. but it was only a little flex of muscle; more seems on the way. What could the Western World

do? Except for idle verbal threats, they had to remain impassive for fear of a Third World War, but some kind of measure had to be taken. It started with the wheat embargo, then he realized boycotting the Olympics, a lot of glamor would be lost, as would a lot of the prestige that is accompanied by hosting the games. Furthermore, I ask, How can any non-Iron Curtain country support the games of this country whose actions are against the ideals of the Olympic games and are severely injurious to a member of the IOC. Well Mr. Killanin? No country should glorify the U.S.S.R. by attending its games. By pulling out, the United States has made the Moscow games a much less prestigious and important affair which has the effect of deflating and humiliating the Soviet Union. If no further action is possible, then the boycott makes a lot of sense.

As for the athletes we sympathize but to be mature and responsible one must learn to sacrifice oneself for more important things. The strength of the nation is more important than the thrill of competing. We must show support for those people in Afghanistan and side with

the boycott because World Freedom is more important than two weeks of competition.

Thus, some course of action is needed to show an-

ger at the Soviet Move. Though we are unable to do anything military, a boycott is something that can be done. Knowing the Psychological conse-

quences, it is imperative that we do boycott because if we don't, then we're but a weak nation surrendering to the bigger one. Julio Yulla

A Day in the life of Gary Numan

This morning I unplugged Dad. He had become a nuisance. I caught him booby trapping the micro wave. Must send him in for adjustments. Had breakfast: steroid capsules and rust. I drove down to the airport to listen to the planes. It's loud there. I like the sound of metal. I'm back in my room now. TURN OFF THE LIGHTS. TURN OFF THE SOUND. I'M SO EXPOSED. Minds are rusting. Everyone lies. I'm still confusing love with need.

... and now for the review.

Gary Numan's second North American album, "The Pleasure Principle", is a minor masterpiece. Like a good sci-fi flick it transports you to another age. Music for the Human Ice Age. The title itself is ironic as there is no mention of pleasure on any of the 12 tracks on Principle. Numan has constructed a world of metal, isolation, and fear. The lyrics are minimalist in nature. More is implied than directly stated, yet the message comes through loud and clear.

"We're in the building
Where they make us grow
And I'm frightened by
The liquid engineers
Like you."
"Metal"
"Here in my car
The image breaks down
Will you visit me. Please.
If I open my doors
In cars."
"Cars"

The lyrics are complemented by elaborately simple synthesizer and percussion, and driving bass. The result is a cross between Kraftwerk and Talking Heads. "Airplane", the first track I've heard in years. The revving,

throbbing bass and rising synthesizer really capture the feeling of take-off. Bassist Paul Gardiner and drummer Cedric Sharpley form an impressive rhythm section. They contribute handsomely to Numan's future shock sound.

One of the best things about Principle is Numan's voice, which is tailor-made for his songs. Numan sings in a detached, yet human voice that is made distinctive by his British accent, which he makes no attempt to conceal. Never is he forced to wader outside his limited vocal range.

I Pleasure Principle has a major flaw, it is the sameness of the songs that is inherent in the Numan formula. All the songs are structured in a similar fashion, with prominent drums, throbbing bass and lilting machine-like synthesizer drones. It can be argued that the repetition heightens the futuristic atmosphere of the record. All in all, an excellent album whose brilliance is diminished only by the restrictions of its formula.

Rating: 8 electro-shock treatments

"The Undertones" - The Undertones (Sire)

This band from Northern Ireland reminds me of trying to blow bubbles with Jell-O - fun, but frustrating after a while. These guys go at a breakneck pace all through the album. None of the 16 songs are over three minutes long, in fact seven are under two minutes and therein lies the 'Tones problem. The pace never lets up, thus limiting the scope of the record. The Undertones motto is play fast, get in as many guitar hooks as possible and blow off the lyrics. Ahh, the lyrics. The English language presents a major stumbling block to the 'Tones. They never deal with anything deeper than their frustrations with girls and their idea of a chorus is to repeat the title of the song.

Despite the aforementioned shortcomings, there is an raw feeling that is reminiscent of The Clash's first album. The record is charmingly dumb. The tunes are all catchy, if lacking in inspiration and what the lack in talent they make up in enthusiasm. This one should go over big with the Ramones crowd.

"The Specials" - The Specials (Chrysalis)

Right off the bat I'd like to get one thing straight; The Specials are not a Mr. Rogers spin-off group. They are the current rage in England, and for good reason. The Specials are a racially mixed group and it shows in their varied influences. They combine reggae, punk, rhythm and blues and ska to make what is known as Mod music. The hybrid is for the most part eminently successful. Mod music is dance music. Its message is simple: Have fun while you're young. This is not to say that the lyrics are neglected; The Specials articulate quite well on English society. A number of songs deal with the evils of giving up the carefree bachelor life for the responsibilities of married life. "She thinks that she'll be happy When she's hanging out the nappies. If that's a happy marriage. Then I prefer to be unhappy."

"Stupid Marriage"

Elvis Costello has done a good job in his first turn in the producers chair. The sound is clean and vibrant.

The main problem with the album is the singing. Neither of the two singers is up to the task of singing the softer songs, but this is not a major problem on the faster songs. The Specials excel on the songs that are dear to their hearts; songs about doormen and "rude boys", such as "A Message To You, Rudy", "Nite Klub", "Concrete Jungle" and "Monkey Man".

In clubs all over England, kids are skanking (Mod dance) to the infectious beat of The Specials'. I can't say I blame them. This is music for the Eighties; music by the people, for the people and of the people.

At one point, Michael Cohen got stuck to the ground and couldn't lift his






